Council News

Council met on May 21 at 6:30 by Google Meet. The Annual Report was presented and highlighted many of the successes and challenges of the past year. The whole report will be made available on the School Council website, found **here**. Achievements listed include improved financial controls and management, a strengthened focus on bringing together the RPS community, increased Council participation, and the ongoing success of the Healthy Snack program. Challenges facing Council in the coming year included an adjustment to less fundraising, maintaining an open and responsible financial culture, diversifying and simplifying the hot lunch program, and adjusting to the many changes brought by COVID-19. Con't...

While Council's fiscal year ends in July, a financial update showed that, thanks to the hard work and generosity of many, Council is on track to end this year with **\$1 387.14** after hot lunch is reimbursed and all accounts are settled.

Decisions made by Council included:

- To reestablish Council banking at the CIBC. This will help to facilitate issuing hot lunch and milk refund cheques.
- Approval of the new <u>Funds Management Guide</u> and <u>Guide for Fundraisers and Events</u>, which will now guide the raising and safekeeping of Council funds.
- Council adjourned until September 16 at 6:30pm.
